6. CBR Moot, 21st Aus Rover Moot Report

E. Hewitt spoke to B. Mullers report, noting updates from each department. Currently CBR moot has 300 applications and growing. Feedback is that Rovers are hesitant to apply until all activities are released. CRB working to rectify this matter soon. CBR currently also working on the distribution of an international contingent leaders handbook. There are 24 expeditions, info has been shared with contingent leaders, and will be released in the next 2 weeks.

QLD requested info flyers to be distributed so that branches can start to advertise the moot.

7. Abridged Event Management Course

7.1 Proposal for funding an abridged event management course

N. Wood spoke to her paper requesting funding for an event management course; with SAIT 4th-7th October in Adelaide. The course will fully fund one participant from each branch to attend and will fund five key members of the Tasmanian Moot planning team (12 total), and will also cover the costs of the trainers. Other trainees are welcome to attend but must secure their own funding.

Note that this weekend is a public holiday for ACT, NSW, SA, and Queensland
Accommodation has already been sourced and trainers have already had the weekend blocked out.

9.1 Rover Challenge Fund Scope.

R. Grimshaw spoke to the paper on the Rover Challenge fund; this in principle has been agreed to at the NRC Conference. The project officer for this activity is Max Kelly. M. Kelly noted that the scope and procedure will be drafted and presented to the NRC at the next remote meeting with the intended launch date being mid year.

10. NRC Financials

10.1 2019/2020 Budgets

A. Hilditch spoke to the budget paper for the next financial year. It had 2 years worth of comparable actuals. The fee itself will not rise this year, staying at \$4.30 + \$1 for moot buddies. With \$4,000 in surplus from the operating account from the previous two years to go towards moot buddies.

10.2 Moot Buddies Applications & Closing Date

R. Grimshaw noted that CBR Moot would keep applications opened until December. Moot buddies needs to close before this. R. Grimshaw proposed a closing date of September. ACT raised that the Moot has a general payment plan which wont work for this date. R. Grimshaw noted that he would discuss with the CBR moot committee the closing dates balancing; Applications, refunds, contingent travel and payment dates.

11. NRC Items for Information.

11.1 Symbolic Framework Guide

At the NRC conference the Symbolic Framework paper was endorsed. This guide will assist crews with the transition. It is envisaged that all crews will have made the transition in this regard by end of 2019.

11.2 Website Guidelines

E. Bridger distributed a guidelines document that will enable BRC's maintain a professional looking website on behalf of the rovers of their branch. It includes guidelines that will ensure the consistent use of the Rovers logo and rover scouts branding to make the section more recognisable.

11.3 Grassroots Rovers Project Officers Idea

E. Bridger proposed that the exec would look to task grassroots rovers with short-term projects for the NRC. The projects would be advertised, and BRC being able to vet their rovers, to ensure good standing.

11.4 NAISC Representation.

In discussion with D. Mayor over the Rover sections continued representation at the National Adults in Scouting Committee. The NRC Vice Chair currently represents the NRC. Please lobby your Chief Commissioner to ensure that the Rover section is represented on this important committee.

12. National Rover Service Award.

12.1 New NRSA certificates.

The National Support Officer has distributed the new design of the NRSA that incorporates the new logo. This will be presented from the 1st of August 2019 onwards.

13. Branch Reports

13.1 Training;

QLD – Running an event management course, sending a few Rovers down to do advanced training in NSW or ACT

VIC – Pushing RPL of bushwalking as it is becoming a major preventative of Rovers completing Advanced

NSW – Aiming to run a Basic course every two to three months.

13.2 Program

QLD – Large attendance at QBRC, however an event also had to be cancelled due to lack of attendance.

ACT – All crews to hopefully be transitioning to the new award scheme at the end of the year.

13.3 Governance

VIC – New NRC delegate, Megan Rogers in attendance.

NSW – AGM and handover on the 14th of April. Angus Boxall to be the new NRC delegate.

SA – Exec Officer resigned, currently promoting to fill the position.

QLD – new exec starts next month.

13.4 Marketing

QLD – Redid their marketing plan and have seen an increase in post engagement on Facebook through the use of live stream.

13.5 Learning(s)

ACT – Read the branch constitution to gauge voting rights at Branch AGM.

QLD – Had to suspend rover memberships due to non-compliance with eLearning requirements.

13.6 General

ACT – submitted Branch report.

14. General Business

VIC congratulated the new NRC exec on their work over the last two months and preparing and delivering a comprehensive agenda.

SA requested that A. Hilditch complete the correct A1 form in time for BRC next week.

QLD enquired on the status of filling the external auditor position and NRC Advisor role. E. Bridger noted that the NRC advisor Role closed last week and several applications were received. The external auditor role will be advertised in the Scouts Australia Enews this month.

ACT raised concerns over the lateness of papers being submitted for the meeting and requests that an effort be made to keep with outlined timeframes.

KEY POINTS

The executive had a very productive handover weekend in Adelaide. The agenda consisted of goal setting, developing a team code, a team building activity, sorting through the minutes and workshop outcomes to identify and assign action tasks, updating and restructuring the strategic plan, and set the budget.

Firstly, I'd like to remind Branches to send through their project officers/NRC Delegates as they are elected over the coming months. This supports the NRC to be able to complete work which benefits all of us.

The following is a summary of items for the council to note:

1. I've developed an action item list for the executive to provide further accountability. This action item list is being continually updated by the NRC Executive and will be presented at each remote meeting.
2. I attended the National Team meeting at the beginning of February. The only item which was of direct relevant to the NRC is about the restructure of the NEC. Phil mentioned this at conference, but in early April, NOC/NEC/National Council will meet to change the structure of the NEC to the following:
 - NEC Executive
 - 8 x Branch representatives
 - 4 x members who are selected by the Branch representatives and NEC executive to provide diversity, representation and ensure there are members with financial and legal expertise

- There must be at least two people under the age of 30 on the NEC, they can be represented in any membership role on the NEC

Concern was raised with me over the restructure of the NEC because the NRC no longer has a permanent position on the council. I have discussed this with the previous NRC Chair, the current executive and other national commissioners and am satisfied that this will not disadvantage the Rover section. The culture of the NOC/NEC relationship has changed in recent years, with the NOC discussing items in depth, and the NEC being more of a 'rubber stamp' approval system. I am happy to advocate for the NRC to be selected in the 4 x members who are selected by Branch representatives, if the Council believes this is important.

3. There is ongoing discussion about the place of the NRC in the National Youth Program Team (NYPT). We have been a place on the Program Management Board until it is dissolved, at which point I will again push for the NRC to be on the NYPT.
4. The National Rover Council Advisor applications shut last Thursday evening. Thank you to everyone who pushed this within your Branch and on social media. The position was very well received, with a very healthy number of applicants. Selections for this is ongoing and should be finalised by the end of March.
5. I wrote up a document outlining the scope and deliverables for the NRC External Review Consultant, which was an outstanding task from the NRC Conference. This went out in the February e-news and advertised on Facebook and will shut at the end of March. Please encourage anyone you know who has the ideal skillset and is not currently tied to the Rover section to apply.
6. The Rover Service Award medal has been updated by the National Office with the new logo.
7. I've created a symbolic framework guide and website guideline which will be discussed later in this agenda.
8. The National Office has contacted me regarding Rover logos and RSA certificates. I will provide an update on this later in this agenda.
9. The executive is looking to implement a new project officer structure, more on this will be provided later in this agenda.
10. The executive will be organising an online catch up for BRC Chairs, and for Advisors for information sharing and support purposes. We will provide some conversation prompts for these.

The focus for the next couple of months for me will be working through the action item list, with a focus on working with the YPR Coordinating Team to create more resources for

Rovers changing to the new youth program. I will also be advocating for changes to major events, such as reduced contingent fees and better welfare for Rovers.

The NRC external consultant will (hopefully) be appointed before the next remote meeting, as will the NRC Advisor.

 - Communication management;
 - Risk management;
 - Procurement
- The course will fully fund one participant from each branch to attend and will fund five key members of the Tasmanian Moot planning team (12 total), and will also cover the costs of the trainers (2). Other trainees are welcome to attend but must secure their own funding.
- Note that this weekend is a public holiday for ACT, NSW, SA, and Queensland
- Accommodation has already been sourced and trainers have already had the weekend blocked out.

Website Guidelines

National Rover Council

The following are guidelines to assist BRCs and Units with designing their websites. These have been developed to provide consistency across the Rover Scout section.

Colour scheme:

The 'Rover Red' is to be tied into the colour scheme of the website and appear as a theme for the site. This can be subtle, such as including the red in buttons and tabs, or more obvious, such as in headers, footer and banners.

Page name:

The page name when searched on Google should contain 'Rover Scouts' – eg. Queensland Rover Scouts, WA Rover Scouts, etc.

The term 'Rover Scouts' should always be used when referring to the Rover section in communications targeted towards the public. This means for areas of the website which are accessible by the general public, Rover Scouts is the correct terminology. For your member-specific areas which require a login, using Rovers is appropriate.

This helps the public identify that we are part of Scouts, rather than another miscellaneous recreational club (eg. car club or football club).

This should be the case for all platforms – from websites, to Facebook, to Instagram.

Logo:

The Rover Scouts logo (with the option of the Branch name underneath) should be placed on the top-right hand side of the website header. This can be instead of, or alongside your Branch's own logo.

When the Rover Scouts logo is clicked on, it should re-direct to www.rovers.scouts.com.au



Fonts:

Nunito Sans or Arial should be used for all website content – this is in line with the Brand Book for Scouts Australia. Nunito Sans can be downloaded from here:

Headings:

Nunito Sans Black
eg. 38pt/38pt Leading, -10 tracking

Body Copy:

Nunito Sans Regular/Bold
eg. 10/12pt Leading, -10 tracking

Photo Captions:

Nunito Sans Light
eg. 10/12pt Leading, -10 tracking

Majority of text is left aligned, in upper and lower case.
Centred and right aligned text may be used if required.

Language:

'Rover Scouts' to be used instead of 'Rovers' for all materials targeted at the public, for the reasons outlined in the 'Page Name' section.

Once a Branch has transitioned into the new program, the following language must be updated:

- 'Unit' to replace 'Crew';
- 'Achievement pathways' to replace 'award scheme';
- References to 'Squire training' to be removed;
- References to the Knighthood theme should be removed – this includes images. It is up to individual units to choose their symbolic framework, rather than BRCs;
- 'Knights and squires' to be 'mentorship system' or 'mentors and mentees' or similar;
- Any reference to the Rover Scouts Australia motto being "service" to be updated to "beyond the horizon". Note: this does not apply to Branches whose motto includes "service".

The exception to the items above is where there is a 'History' page on a website.

Pictures:

From the Scouts Australia Brand Book:

"There are two types of photography that really show off Scouting at its best.

- Photos of Scouting in action (usually youth, outdoors)
- Photos taken from the point of view of the participant (eg. showing what it feels like to be in a tent, or canoe, where only part of the body may be visible. Eg. hands, feet, or back)"

Essential website sections:

Each page should have: What are Rover Scouts? (or similar). Branches can personalise the description to suit their own Branch, however, it should convey the same meaning as the description provided on the Scouts Australia Rover Scout page, so that potential members are getting consistent information. This is contained on: <https://scouts.com.au/join/rovers/>

In this section you should also provide a direct link to either the BRC or relevant Branch's 'membership enquiry' form.

A 'crew locator' function (map or otherwise) is also helpful for prospective members.

A 'What's on?', 'Events' or similar page should be created, with links to the websites of major events such as the upcoming national Moot. A calendar of events relevant to the Rover Scout section could also be added.

An 'Awards' or 'Program' section which talks about the Rover Service Award (and how to apply) and the Baden Powell Scout Award should be included as a minimum.

If this is a 'program' section, you may choose to provide links to adventurous activity teams and information about the new youth program.

A 'Resources' page which lists relevant resources for that BRC and Branch – eg. Working with Children check, Child Safe policy, etc.

A 'Training' section which has details of upcoming Basic or Advanced courses, and details of how to contact the Training Officer or team.

A link to the eLearning should also be included.

A contact section should be created, and this should have up-to-date links to the www.rovers.scouts.com.au website, alongside each Branch's Rover website (or Branch website when no Rover website is available).

Examples of optional website sections:

A social feed which links to a hashtag, Facebook or Instagram page can be incorporated to increase engagement across platforms.

If your branch has merchandise, then a merchandise tab with an online shop or details on where to purchase items directly. A link to the national merchandise register could also be provided.
